C. Personal Statement

1. You are required to write and submit a personal statement as part of your application. Knowledge of your background, motivation to study law, intellectual interests, personal or professional goals, or any way in which you will add to the range of ideas, opinions, or scholarship of the law school, can help you distinguish yourself from other applicants. Ultimately, you must decide what additional information to present and how to present it. Please limit your statement to three pages, double spaced, in a 12 point font.
2. A resume is required. Please list all jobs, activities, and honors that you have been involved with since graduating high school. The committee particularly finds resumes helpful when applicants detail their duties and responsibilities and how much time per week was invested in the activity. For those involvements that are unique to the school, detailed information regarding the relevance, importance, and/or prestige is requested. Honors, awards, prizes, scholarships, fellowships, and memberships in honor societies or academic or social fraternities/sororities are also important when evaluating applicants. Resumes should provide a clear chronological trail that allows the committee to understand the timing of events. There is no maximum page length. A curriculum vitae may be used in place of a resume.
3. (Optional) In evaluating your LSAT score and academic performance, and in fulfilling our commitment to diversity, the Admissions Committee may consider relevant such things as a history of social, economic, or educational disadvantage, cultural or language differences, disability, or unusual family circumstances. If you would like these factors to be considered in the evaluation of your application, you may attach a separate statement or use an electronic attachment. Please limit your statement to two pages, double spaced, in a 12 point font.

D. Character and Fitness

The American Bar Association Standards and Rules of Procedure require law schools to advise each applicant that, because of the high ethical standards to which lawyers are held, state bar requirements deal with character and fitness of an applicant at the time he or she seeks certification to register for the respective state bar examinations. State requirements vary and applicants should obtain information about qualifications for admission to the bar of the state where they intend to practice. The ABA Standards and Rules of Procedure allow law schools to seek information on character and fitness to ensure that appropriate law school qualifications are met. However, acceptance by the School of Law does not guarantee an applicant's subsequent qualification for admission to the bar.

You are advised that law school applications are often subpoenaed by the boards of law examiners when applicants seek certification to register for state bar examinations. Accordingly, it is very important that you disclose ALL information that may in any way reflect on your character and fitness to practice law, including, but not limited to, disciplinary and criminal proceedings. Consistent with standard requirements for bar admission, you must disclose each instance even though the charges may have been dismissed or you were acquitted, adjudication was withheld or a conviction was reversed, set aside or vacated, or the record sealed or expunged. In criminal matters, you are required to disclose both the charge and the disposition. If you have any uncertainty as to how to answer the following questions or their meaning, you should seek the advice of the Associate Dean for Admissions prior to submitting the completed application. Failure to disclose any of these matters may result in denial of admission to the School of Law, exclusion from the School of Law, or a negative recommendation from the Dean of the School of Law to the board of law examiners.

If the answer to any of the questions below is yes, please attach a full statement of relevant facts, including (1) charge, (2) date, and (3) disposition, including fine, costs of court, or other penalty on a separate sheet or electronic attachment. Failure to provide all of this information will slow the processing of your application.
